From the Pastor...

This year, the season of Epiphany puffs up its chest and expands to its largest capacity. Easter is “late” this year... so Epiphany picks up the slack. This provides a rare opportunity to more fully explore the wonder of this all-but-forgotten season of the Church.

Epiphany - where the focus is on mission and ministry. Epiphany - where we make a tour-de-force through the Wise Men, Jesus’ Baptism, the miracle at Cana, and onward. The baby quickly gives way to the adult Jesus. And the adult Jesus is moving with purpose and alacrity. He is, quite literally, a man on a mission. That mission is expansive and inclusive.

It is easy to get lost in the frenetic activity. To confuse activity with progress. It is very easy to become so enamored with “doing” something, that we forget the starting point and underpinning. Right after the Day of the Epiphany (January 6th) - we move to the Baptism of Jesus. Baptism is at the very beginning of this amazing season.

Baptism is at the beginning of each Christian’s journey. We walk wet with baptismal waters. Daily we return to the covenant God makes with us. The action belongs to God - the response is ours. Activity is all well and good... when seen in response to God’s action and not as a prerequisite for it. Our foundation, like the foundation of Jesus’ ministry, is anchored in our Baptism. All of our life - all of our Stewardship - is joyfully given in response to that first “God action.”

There is a great story from the Cherokee Indian tradition about “stump sitting.” It involves a young man’s “rite of passage”, but it works well within baptismal imagery too. The young man’s father takes him into the forest blindfolded and leaves him alone. He is required to sit on a stump the whole night and not take off the blindfold until the first rays of light shine through. He is all by himself. He cannot cry out for help to anyone. Once he survives the night, he is ready to begin his adult journey. He cannot tell the other boys about experience. Each young man must come to his own understanding.

The boy in our story was, naturally, terrified. He could hear all kinds of noise. Beasts were all around him. Maybe even a human would hurt him. The wind blew the grass and earth and it shook his stump. But he sat stoically, never removing the blindfold. It would be the only way he could enter adulthood. Finally, after a horrific night the sun appeared and he removed his blindfold. It was then that he saw his father sitting on the stump next to him - at watch the entire night.

At the end of Jesus’ Great Commission (Mt. 28), he tells the disciples and us to go and do. And then, as the first disciples are heading out the door, Jesus says simply, “And remember, I am with you ALWAYS, to the end of the age.” Walk we will... walk we must... but we never walk alone.

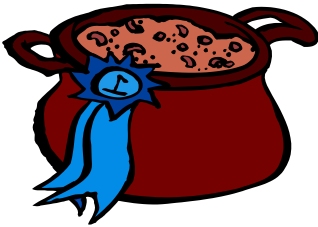

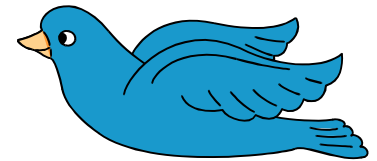

Walking the Sacred Path: An Introduction to Walking the Labyrinth Saturday March 12

Whether you're new to the concept of the mindful contemplative practice of the labyrinth, or you're a seasoned labyrinth walker, we invite you to join us on a Lenten journey as we examine the various paths to spirituality that each member of the community of Christ embarks upon. News from Trinity/HOPE

Trinity/HOPE is blessed to have support in this congregation for its feeding programs for the hungry children in Christian Schools in Haiti. Each month we provide an article (as below) which can be published in church newsletters to aid in updating and keeping our supporters current on our programs.

The week before Thanksgiving each year we have two of our Haitian team members come to the United States to work with us as we hold our signature fundraising events called Thanksgiving Night in the Hunger Fight. While they are here they meet with supporters, shop for items they cannot find in Haiti, attend all the events and keynote them. During their visit I always ask them to write a short article on a particular subject. Below is what our manager/supervisor wrote when I asked him to describe a typical day for a child who attends one of our schools.

This is a honor for me to thank you and share with you how a child live in Haiti.

A child, come to school without take something to eat, but he still happy to come in school where there is Trinity/HOPE's program, because he can find a hot meal every school day.

This child walks about two hours to come to school and two hours back home. This kid didn't eat at night and no breakfast too and his favorite food is rice or corn and bean [The meal Trinity/HOPE serves at each school daily.] So if [he didn't get food at school] this child pass this all long day without eating something, because there is nothing at home to eat.

Ask Pastor John

These comments can be related to discussions and comments over several months.

NO, NOT TODAY ---- I HAVE NOT PREPARED MYSELF FOR HOLY COMMUNION

A few of you know I have served as visitation pastor for a congregation in “south Nashville” recently until the new pastor arrived. I visited the home-bound and a few hospitalized. This usually meant one or two days of visiting per month.

On the final day of visits, I was preparing to include Holy Communion in the devotions, when the woman I was **visiting said, “No, not today --- I have not prepared myself for Communion.”**

I had ministered Holy Communion to her in previous visits, so I did not mention the sacrament in the phone conversation to schedule the visit.

Momentarily I was surprised at her refusal. Then I realized that she was reflecting a piety that was more common in the past.

I could have said the devotions would include confession and forgiveness, a form of preparation. Pastorally, I sensed it better to omit the sacrament for her that day.

Lutherans have had various expressions of preparation for Holy Communion, including:

- Announcing (phoning) to the pastor of one’s intention to commune**
- Personal “examination of conscience” as part of personal devotions**
- Meditation on Holy Communion and its significance
- Individual Confession and Forgiveness *(cf. ELW page 243 / LBW page 196)*
- Corporate Confession and Forgiveness *(cf. ELW page 238 / LBW page 193)*
[Corporate Confession and Forgiveness in both ELW and LBW is designated for other reasons than as a congregational preparation for Holy Communion.]

Older worship books included in a SPECIAL PREPARATORY SERVICE this Exhortation to Holy Communion:

Dearly Beloved:

The Holy Supper of our Lord Jesus Christ hath been instituted for the special comfort and strengthening of those who humbly confess their sins, and who hunger and thirst after righteousness.

Forasmuch as we intend to come to the Lord's Table,

it becometh us diligently to examine ourselves as St. Paul exhorteth us.

We find, when we do this, that we are under the dominion of sin and death. To save us from death, make us children of God and exalt us to everlasting life, our Lord Jesus Christ had mercy on us, took our nature upon him, and himself became obedient unto death.

In order that we should believe this with greater confidence and be strengthened in cheerful obedience to his will, he hath instituted the Sacrament of the Altar in which he giveth us his Body and his Blood to eat and to drink. Whoever eateth this Bread and drinketh this Cup, firmly believing the words of Christ, liveth in Christ and Christ in him, and hath eternal life.

We should also do this in remembrance of him, showing his death, that he was delivered for our offences and raised again for our justification. For all that he hath done we are bound to give him most hearty thanks, to take up our cross and follow him, and as he gave commandment, to love one another as he hath loved us. For as we are all partakers of this one Bread and drink of this one Cup, so we are all one body in him.

Service Book and Hymnal, page 250

Sometimes this Exhortation was included in Confession and Forgiveness in Sunday worship. **The Exhortation includes themes included in the “occasional communion sermon.”** I wish that an updated exhortation were an option in current worship books.

The Episcopal BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER includes a similar exhortation to Holy Communion on page 316 that can be used “in whole or in part, either during the Liturgy or at other times.” I surmise that it seldom is used.

How do you and I prepare to receive Holy Communion? The answer is a paradox!

On one hand, St. Paul and the Scriptures underscore preparation.
On the other hand, we can do nothing but accept this gift graciously.

**One's chronological age and life experiences may influence understandings.
Yet, the Lord's Supper remains a Holy Mystery.**

Maybe the best answer is a sense of the Holy Presence.
